The 1st Regiment, Royal Australian Artillery Band welcomed guests on arrival. Further entertainment throughout the afternoon was provided by the Australian Army Band, Brisbane and the Brass Quintet of the US Navy 7th Fleet Band. There were also performances by "Australia's Andrew Sisters" and professional dancers from the Orchard Dance Studio.

It was an honour for us to escort the seven WWII veterans to their seats, as well as the other guests who attended, approximately 200. There were five (5) men and three (3) ladies WWII Veterans with an average age of 101. George Churchward 101, Lloyd Arthur Statham 99, Lily Milne Ward 101, Dennis Wellbelove 104, Lindsay Scott 99, Murelle Ahern 100, and Cynthia Clifford nee Cadd 101. Sadly, Roger Landsborough North 103, was unable to attend.

Hugh's goal for the day was to deliver an enjoyable, memorable, and fun filled event. He definitely achieved this outstandingly. The international mix of entertainment reflected Australia's key allies being the US, and listening to the recording of Prime Minister Ben Chifley's announcement to the nation that the war was over, this took the guests back to the time when peace had finally arrived. Another of the highlights of Hugh's achievements was a fly past of a WWII Spitfire.

To me the real celebration and honour of the day was the privilege of being in the company of members of this legendary generation. The seven (7) WWII Veterans who were able to attend represented around one million Australians who served

in this worldwide conflict. Sadly, so few are left to thank today.

VETERANS' AND FAMILIES' WELLBEING HUB CABOOLTURE

The committee was invited to visit the Caboolture Hub on Friday 12 August. We were welcomed by Carolyn Timms who gave us a tour of the Hub and its facilities. On arrival we enjoyed a cuppa and home cooked pancakes, which were delicious.

The Veterans' and Families' Wellbeing Hub in Caboolture, operated by Lives Lived Well and the Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia (Queensland Branch), is a purpose-built setting that provides social and wellbeing support for veterans and their families. Open to all current and former serving ADF members, including reservists, plus their families or carers.

The monthly activities calendar on their website details what is happening each day during the month. Every Friday they have "Pancake Friday" from 9 - 11am, No RSVP is required. They also have many craft and other activities available, some require an RSVP. I encourage you to check out their website.

The Hub is open 8:30am – 4:30pm on weekdays. They are closed on weekends and public holidays.

NF 479279 Jean Bird

Jean Bird was born in Manly, Sydney and spent her childhood in and around that area - attending school, church and youth activities in Manly.

Her father had served in the Australian Army in France during WWI, and her three brothers had all volunteered for service in WWII. Her middle brother lost his life on the Sandakan Death March.



Jean also decided to do her bit, enlisting on the 9 May 1944 in Paddington NSW and discharged 25 January 1946. Jean served in the Australian Woman's Army Service, with her service entirely based at Paddington Barracks Sydney, where she assisted with driving duties, guard duty, logistics/Q store and administration tasks.

She used to enjoy marching around the parade ground with the Army Band.

At the end of WWII in the Pacific, she spent the day celebrating in Martin Place and Hyde Park, along with thousands of others.

After demob, Jean decided to become a Salvation Army Officer, and so entered their training college at Petersham. For the next 40 years, she gave of herself to help the less fortunate, in locations across northern NSW and Southern Qld.

She retired to a unit at Riverview Gardens, Riverview Queensland, where she still resides at the age of 99. Jean turns 100 in April next year.

She remains very active at the nursing home and with her church at Bundamba. She is the Patron of the local ANZAC Day Observance Committee, where she leads both the Dawn parade and Main parade each ANZAC Day.

The City of Ipswich honoured her recently on the 80th Anniversary of the end of WWII, and the Ipswich RSL asked her to be the guest speaker for their Commemorative Service on August 15, 2025.

Again, please can I reiterate that I am only a phone call away, if I can assist in helping you through this change please contact me so I can ensure that you are seeking out all the information to assist you.

I am working hard with the committee to arrange for a presentation next year where we will have a guest speaker discuss Support at Home - SaH, access to Veterans Home Care - VHC services and how to navigate utilising these services. There is a lot of support but I am fast finding out that many are unaware what is available.

REMEMBRANCE DAY



A story of just one of our fallen ...



Private John Francis Naughton 3rd Battalion AIF, 6 October 1885 - 18 November 1916

The story of this Australian soldier should be known widely. It is one of the saddest stories I have come across. It is important to read this post to the end, to know the effect this Australian soldier had in shaping how Australia's war dead were treated.

A wounded Australian soldier, who lost both hands, writing a letter by using the stumps of his wrists to hold the pen, most likely at No.1 Australian Auxiliary Hospital, Harefield, England. Most likely he was writing home.

The photograph is of Private John Francis Naughton (6 October 1885 - 18 November 1916). A high school history teacher 3 years ago helped identify Private Naughton as the soldier in the photograph over a hundred years after the photograph was taken.

Private Naughton of Charters Towers, Queensland, was a baker prior to enlistment. He embarked with the 3rd Battalion in September 1914 and served on Gallipoli, where he was wounded on the 14th of August 1915, when a bomb exploded in his hands, also injuring his right thigh and knee. He was evacuated to a hospital ship via Mudros, and from there to England, spending time at King George Hospital, Harefield, Roehampton Hospital, St Mary's Convalescent Hospital, and ultimately to Fulham Hospital.

During his stay in hospital, Private Naughton

fell in love and was going to marry his sweetheart, a nurse who looked after him. He was waiting for his hands to be fitted. His incredible toughness and resilience got him walking a little without crutches, even though he had a serious thigh injury.

Private Naughton died from kidney issues due to his wounds. Initially, he was buried in an open grave, because at the time they couldn't keep pace with the number of men dying in the hospitals. They were still burying soldiers en masse up until 1917.

Individual graves were for officers and nurses, who were honorary officers. The other soldiers were often buried in pits. Private Naughton's body was left exposed at Kensal Green Cemetery in London for weeks. The grave was only covered after protests from Australian expatriates.

Private Naughton's body was exhumed in 1921 and placed in a separate plot for Australian soldiers.

Australian anger over the undignified treatment that Private Naughton received in death led to better burial practices for the fallen. So in death, Private Naughton played an important role in shaping how Australia's war dead were treated.

WARRNAMBOOL RSL


During my recent travels my sister and I stopped at Warrnambool RSL for lunch. Whilst waiting for our lunch to be served, my eye was drawn to a sketch that was on the wall near our table. On taking a closer look it said there was a book available which included the history of the sketch. I asked the staff if it was available to purchase, to which they said we will contact a member of the Sub-Branch. I was advised that it was available and a copy was being brought to the Club for me if I was prepared to wait, which I was.

After lunch, a lady approached our table with the book, as promised. The ladies name is Dr. Carlyn Sproston MA MCultHeritage EdD, after giving me a copy of the book, she showed me around the club where they were renovating the commemorative area. The WWI wall was complete and they were working on the WWII wall. Carlyn told me the history behind some of the photos and artifacts on display, which was very interesting.

I was also introduced to her husband, Dr Ron Sproston MA MCultHeritage EdD, who enthusiastically told me about a school trip that they had taken a number of local school children on, several years ago, to Villers-Bretonneux. Ron reinforced the message, that we so often hear, that the people of Villers-Bretonneux have not forgotten what the Australians did for them. He showed me the photos from that trip including the famous yellow and green sign at the school "DO NOT FORGET AUSTRALIA".

The book I was given referred to the "WARRNAMBOOL SUB-BRANCH R.S.L. 1917 - 2017 SERVING STILL" and is a commemoration of the Club's last 100 years of history, authored by Avis Quarrell. Sadly, I was unable to meet Avis as she had passed away 23 May 2024, aged 100 years and 10 months. Avis served in the AWAS during WWII as a driver, Regimental Number VF511603, she was then Yvonne "Avis" Bellman. After she discharged in 1946 she married a former 2nd 14th Battalion soldier, becoming dairy farmers on a soldier settlement block at Boorcan, near Terang, moving to Warrnambool in 1976.

The above sketch was donated to the Warrnambool RSL by Avis. It had hung in their home since 1946 having being given to her husband by the artist Tom Meagher who also served in the 2nd 14th Battalion. Tom had drawn the sketch not long after arriving in North Africa. Having looked upon this sketch for around 40 years, Avis "put words into the soldier's heart" and produced a poem of the same name "Night at Mersa Matruh" (pictured right).

NIGHT AT MERSA MATRUH.

I lay on the sand in the desert one night,
Looking at the stars above.

And I thought of the reason for being there
So far from the ones that I love.

It was war, of course. Such a senseless war That brought me here to fight, And I never dreamed, that in all that war, There would be such a beautiful night.

I'd wandered away from the boys in the camp,
For I'd longed for time on my own.
I needed the peace of the sight of the stars
And to be in the desert, alone.

And one star above, in the night-darkened sky, Shone down on the sand where I lay. It seemed to me, that it promised such hope For a peace that would come one day.

My thoughts took wings and flew to my home So far from the dry desert hue. But I knew somehow, I would never forget, That night at Mersa Matruh.

My sincere appreciation to Carlyn and Ron for coming to the RSL with the book and spending their time with me explaining the displays, it was extremely interesting and informative. I think it is great that there are people like Carlyn and Ron and the Warrnambool RSL members who are enthusiastically maintaining the memories and history of our serving forebears and current and future veterans'.


